The title of the Presentation: To Uphold the faith in Clearview Township

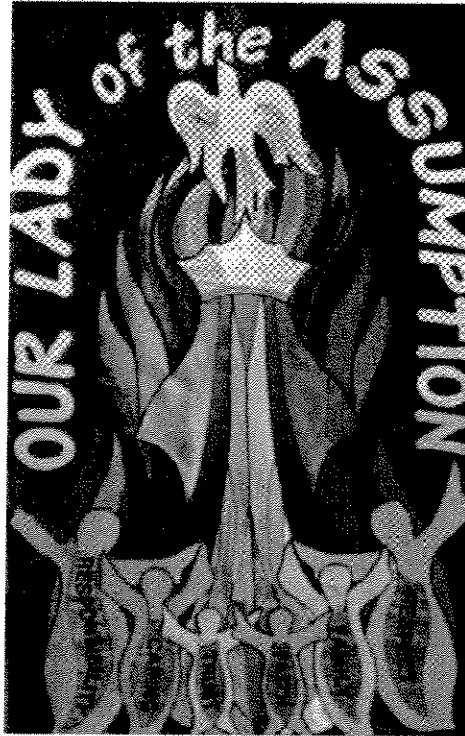
Good evening ladies and gentlemen of the Simcoe Muskoka District Catholic School Board.

Each person in the group I came with tonight loves the Catholic faith and our Lord Jesus Christ. This is why Our Lady of the Assumption is so important to us. Our Lady is the only faith based school in all of Clearview Township. We know that for the future spiritual health of the Clearview Community, it is absolutely necessary that the children of elementary age receive nurture in Catholic Christian values within this community.

It is not enough to think that our family worship time at Church can stem the growing tide of secularism in Clearview. Catholic education must have a presence in our Township along side the Church. This fact is acknowledged by all of what were once called the mainline Protestant Churches. The great and continuing decline in their membership rolls over the past 30 years they directly linked to the removal of prayer and Christian values from the public schools and the replacing of them with secular values. The Protestant Churches found out that they could not expect their children to become faith leaders in their communities with one or two hours a week of Church when for five days of the week, during their most formative years, the children were indoctrinated with secular values.

To develop the kind of Clearview Township we want, our children have to be able to pray together in school every day, supporting each other in the Catholic values, developing their faith and relationship with Jesus Christ. Is our growing Clearview Community to be given over to the secular agenda? Our Lady has been able to ungrudgingly endure facility inadequacies for the sake of Catholicism in our Township and by its belief that in the future the School Board would build upon the foundation it has laid.

Our rural students are all bussed to school and the majority would continue to be bussed regardless of which Clearview site is selected for a new school.

The last time a delegation presented here in 2003, they stressed the importance of keeping Our Lady of the Assumption open until a new school was constructed in an unspecified location in Clearview Township. We once again urge you to keep our school open until a new Catholic school can be built in Clearview Township. **We are the only Catholic school in Clearview Township.**

Simcoe County is projecting and planning for higher growth rates than the provincial growth plan. Currently there is a subdivision of 132 single dwelling homes and 126 townhomes being built in Wasaga Beach within walking distance of St. Noel Chabanel. Draft plan approval has been granted for the development of approximately 500 homes in Creemore. Clearview's official plan designates large settlement areas in Stayner, Creemore, and New Lowell. These future residential developments will contribute to increasing enrolment in Clearview schools. New Lowell Central Public School has had a steadily increasing enrolment in the last several years. A new Catholic school in Clearview will enable families to have their children educated in the Catholic faith. Clearview can support a new Catholic school.

To the Board of Trustees of the Simcoe Muskoka Catholic District School Board

This letter is in response to the Pupil Accommodation Review process and the staff report that are before you.

As was mentioned in Point #8 of the staff report, I would like to speak regarding the "unique situation of the military community, along with a strong desire to maintain a presence on Base Borden," which "had an impact on the committee's decision to eliminate that option that suggested closing POP."

Staff indicate that they cannot support the continued existence of Prince of Peace for a number of reasons. As is pointed out in Point #15, they highlight the main reasons being that it is a leased building and that an estimated \$1.38 million are required in retrofits. (They site items needing repair to be doors and hardware; windows and window sills (spalling), roof -in poor condition, asbestos tiles on the roof top mechanical units, millwork -in poor condition, paint falling off -also designated substance in the paint, boilers, pumps, etc all require replacement, no building automation, old lighting systems need replacement). They highlight that the school is not at capacity and that a number of students live off the Base and are bussed from outside the boundary based on a one year approval. They also indicate that other military bases have recently approved closing schools on their bases.

I would like to respond to those reasons.

1. **The building is leased.** Obviously, in 1999 when major renovations occurred at a cost of \$2.125 million, the board was aware that this was going to be a leased building. It was realized that money was being invested in the students and that it was supporting the military community. A commitment was made then, why is the commitment to support the military not being made now? We hope that the board of trustees can continue to support our unique community and realize that monies were invested in the future of our students and not in recouping money from a physical building.
2. **Retrofit money needed to be invested in the school at a cost of \$1.38 million.** If you look at the list of items that need to be replaced/fixed/upgraded, many of them are superficial that would be required in any building. If you break that down over a period of 10 years, it is very manageable. The major items are the boiler and roof repair. The boiler is estimated at about \$400 000. It is my understanding though that the boilers are a shared cost between the English and French school boards. I think it is better to invest monies into repair that to throw away the \$2.125 that was already invested!
3. **School not at capacity.** While it is not at capacity, the school has very distinct and unique needs. Most of the kids who go to Prince of Peace are very transient. We get posted every 2-4 years. So ours kids will have attended 3-5 schools

The staff indicate that it is “ not financially viable to consider spending millions of dollars to upgrade building components that are not owned by the Board and where we would have to walk away from the school without any financial gain.”

To me, it doesn't make sense that you would close a school when it makes money for the board. The money per pupil that we are making for the board, I'm sure, would go a long way to cover many of the costs necessary to upgrade and retrofit our building.

Just a few other points I would like to make. Our school currently has a property size of 6.64 ha to play on. Our Lady of Grace has the smallest site size of all 5 schools in the Review at 2.02 ha; that is only a third the size of property. Putting all three schools on that property will cause congestion and overcrowding issues. Our kids have a big space to spread out in during recess. You crowd these kids together and you are going to get more discipline issues, more bullying and more injury. I don't want that for my kids.

Staff have indicated that less money is required to maintain newer facilities with more programming space and technical infrastructure. What about wear-and-tear to Our Lady of Grace? Having a school of 450 compared to a school of 250 will make a huge impact on the washrooms, paint, doors and school equipment. In this time of cutbacks, I'm sure there is not a lot of money available to paint schools, fix doors and replace over-used run-down equipment. I want to be proud of my kids school, as I currently am at Prince of Peace. I don't want to come to a school will look run-down and decrepid, like Our Lady of Grace will, after 5 years of use with 450 kids and no budget to maintain it at a high standard!

Bussing Issues with the closure of Prince Of Peace

Sir or Madame of the Board,

I have the following 5 questions in regards to bussing issues with the closure of Prince of Peace School (PoP). There are an additional 3 questions that I would like answered.

1. What will be the cost savings of bussing the 124 students who currently attend Prince of Peace to the new location (Our Lady of Grace)?

a) There will be a requirement for 2 busses to transport students (**1 bus from around Angus and 1 bus from Base**), vice needing 1 bus to transport students from Angus at a cost of approximately \$40,000.00 per year (as stated by the Pupil Accommodation Review committee).

b) This cost could be used to transport the students from Our Lady of the Assumption (who utilise the gym at this school weekly) to PoP in order to raise the numbers in PoP (from 124 to 201), as well as save some transportation costs for class outings.

-That would be the enrolment of Prince of Peace (124) and the enrolment of Our Lady of the Assumption (77). Assuming that all 77 students would opt for this move, and not move over to the Public School System in place in New Lowell.

2. Has there been any thought to the delay in the bus schedule for the checking of ID to access the Base when picking up AND dropping off kids from the Base?

a) The bus from Angus arrives at a time of day that is not overly congested at the front gate (around 0845hrs). With this change in schedule it may take busses much longer to get access to base (upwards of 15-20 minutes). The busiest time of day to access the Base is between 0700- 0745hrs. This delay time increases with the operation of Base Auxiliary Security Force (BASF) exercises (a minimum of 2 per year).

3. Has there been a review of the environmental affect of having this extra traffic waiting to access the Base?

a) There will be an increase in waiting time to access the Base with the busses left idling in traffic.

Military Parent Perspective

Sir or Madame of the Board,

I am here this evening to represent the concerns of military parents of children facing the closure of POP. Although we understand that crunching the financial numbers is a huge factor in the decision as to whether or not to close our school, our children are more than mere numbers, so it cannot be the only factor in your decision. Unfortunately, this was the emphasis of the Board at the 21 Jan 2010 public meeting at POP. We were shown slide upon slide of cost comparisons, enrolment numbers and inaccurate statistics on the projected population growth of the Base. Even the cost to lease the school from the Base was made out to be expensive and it was obvious that the hope was that none of us knew the \$1 per year price tag. Not only did this shake our trust in the accuracy of the remaining information presented, it reinforced our fears that the decision to close our school was already made. Every challenge and concern unique to the children of military parents was blatantly dismissed on the spot that evening. We all left that meeting feeling extremely uneasy and angered that the Board is seemingly disinterested about our military children, and they will most assuredly be the ones who will lose the most from the closure of POP.

I can tell you that CF members serve this country with pride and we do so without ever feeling the need for recognition in return. Both my spouse and I are military members and in our combined 30 years of service we too have never felt the need to point out what we do or why we do it, until now, because this involves our children. My husband, who cannot be here tonight because he is on duty, grew up with a father who was, and still is, a CF member. He moved around frequently, within Canada and overseas, so I very much understand how being the child of military parents affects them. They never asked for this life, to have to move every couple of years. Ask yourself how difficult it would be to be that child or to tell your child to happily move to a new city or location every few years, and by the way, don't be too scared to constantly make new friends, don't worry if you're going to fit in at school, hope the other kids understand why mom or dad is away and can't take you to birthday parties or sports, hope your teacher understands when you explain why you are so sad, or hope they just know why you are so sad because you are too afraid to say why. The only thing that can possibly mitigate experiencing these terrifying feelings is the comfort of knowing that every kid in your school feels exactly the same way you do.

The advantages of a small school.

One cannot talk about the advantages of a small school without thinking about the particular needs and issues faced by our children. "There's no life like it", travel and excitement come at a price. That price is time away from our families. Whether in the form of courses, taskings outside the area, pre-deployment training and deployments this means that a primary caregiver will be away. Having a spouse away has a ripple effect on family dynamics. Routines are changed and stress is added as more responsibilities are undertaken by fewer family members. Children and spouses experience longing and worry about their missing mother or father. A small school environment like Prince of Peace can best meet the challenges that our children will face.

A small school means fewer overall students and teachers will more than likely know all students, thus more able to spot problems and possible changes to a child's routine behaviour. The teachers and administration also have an intimate knowledge of the particular challenges faced by us and our children. Also many military spouses volunteer at the school. Prince of Peace also has their rainbow program. This program provides counselling and support services when a parent is overseas.

The children of Prince of Peace are also their own special support group. The majority of students are from military families and so they face the same unique situations,.

How comforting it must be in knowing that your classmates understand what you are going through, as you are posted yet again and must start at a new school, or that one of your parents is away from home. This kinship is unique to a school such as prince of peace, where these common challenges help our children make friends easier. Just knowing that our children have the support from the teachers and administration and from their own peers makes it that much easier.

There is also the location of the school to be considered. It is located on base in a close knit community with many unique services and resources such as the MFRC. Parents are never far away enabling more frequent and better interaction among parents, students, teachers and administrators. This closeness also enables more frequent volunteering from parents. Also the base has its own emergency services only a couple of minutes away.

Military children face different challenges and the best way to help our children is by having the support they can only get at an on base school like Prince of Peace. Prince of Peace has a unique understanding of these challenges and are the best equipped to aid our children.

To the Ladies and Gentlemen of the Board:

I would like to make you aware of the conveniences of keeping the students of Prince of Peace at their current location. We are fortunate to have a school on the Base because it has access to so many facilities!

The Catholic church, St. Joseph's Chapel, is only 1.1 km to the school.

The baseball field and local parkette, which gets used often, is just up the road at 0.6 km away.

The public library again is almost across the road at 0.7 km away.

The military museum is not far away at 1.0 km.

The base theatre is 1.2 km away from the school.

The hockey arena is 1.6 km and the Base gym and Buell Pool is only 1.7 km away.

Base Bike/walking Trails are only 1.0 km away and they go on for kilometers.

As you can see, there are a number of different facilities at the disposal of the staff and students of Prince of Peace. These facilities encourage the school community to enjoy local excursions and a beautiful walk. While the students receive lots of exercise, they also save money because they do not have to book a bus for every event they want to participate in. Being an ecoSchool, they are very into the environment. The reduction of bus fumes supports their overall footprint they are leaving on the earth.

As well, there are well maintained sidewalks to each facility, summer and winter, which makes it easier and safer for staff and students to travel.

Currently, the students are enjoying walking to the pool every other Friday. In June, they will be going every Friday to support the gym programs. It is a great motivator for the students in promoting a healthy lifestyle.

All the students from Prince of Peace always look forward to their next local field trip.

I don't think that Our Lady of Grace has access to as many facilities within walking distance. Would they even consider coming onto the Base to access our facilities if the school population is higher? Bussing costs to bring them onto the Base might make it cost prohibitive. As an example, my daughter goes swimming on Fridays at a cost of \$2 per swim. This is without bussing costs. Bussing could possibly double or even triple that cost!

In this day and age where we are encouraging our kids to be physically active and where we need to be very aware of family finances, we have to be careful that we don't shut doors. Keeping Prince of Peace School open will play a significant role in keeping our kids engaged and physically fit at very reasonable costs.

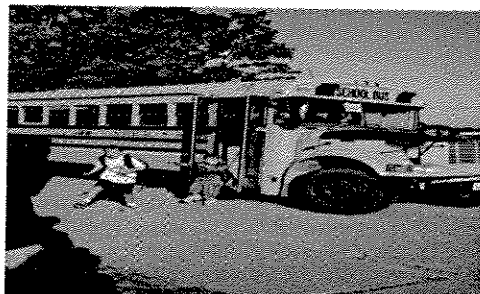

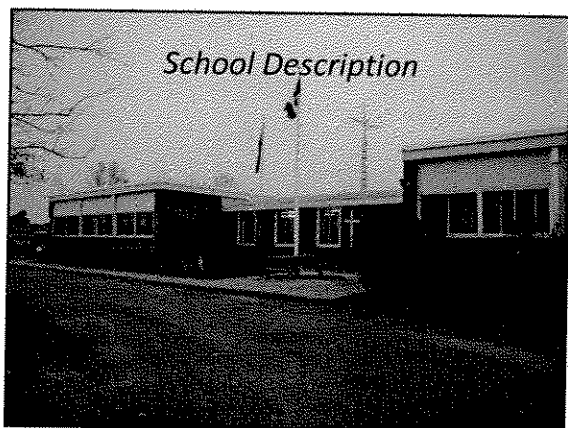
